It offers students an opportunity to learn about public and community issues by working in community agencies and gov't organizations and to apply academic theories and analytical skills to the solution of real-world problems. This program broadens students' UCI experience by exposing them to the "real world" and provides opportunities to conduct research on social issues. Students gain a more realistic perspective of society, greater self-knowledge, and increased leadership skills. The curriculum emphasizes urban contexts & multicultural issues, as well as historical, social, economical, and global perspectives.
