The major introduces the theories, principles, and methods of conducting research in the Social Sciences. Student majors will gain researcher experience, theoretical knowledge, and practical experience while learning about politics, government agencies, law, healthcare, and leadership. In particular, research will be used to solve practical problems and findings will assist in decision making processes in relation to social problems and policy planning.

PUBLIC & COMMUNITY SERVICE: This program integrates academic learning with community and governmental activities. It offers students an opportunity to learn about public and community issues by working in community agencies and gov't organizations and to apply academic theories and analytical skills to the solution of real-world problems.

This program broadens students' UCI experience by exposing them to the "real world" and provides opportunities to conduct research on social issues. Students gain a more realistic perspective of society, greater self-knowledge, and increased leadership skills. The curriculum emphasizes urban contexts & multicultural issues, as well as historical, social, economical, and global perspectives.
