Would you like to be a Social Science teacher in the secondary schools?

Admission to the UCI Single Subject Credential Program is practically guaranteed for those UCI graduates of the Social Science program who have:

- Completed the subject matter preparation program in Social Science (or passed the California Subject Examination for Teachers (CSET)).
- Earned a minimum grade point average of 3.0
- Submitted an application and all supporting documents, including letters of recommendation verifying good character, ability to work with children or youth, and academic readiness for teaching.
- Acquired a Certificate of Clearance from the Commission on Teacher Credentialing (applications available at the UCI Department of Education)
- Passed the CBEST Exam



What does it take to get a Single Subject Social Science Credential?



A Preliminary Single Subject Teaching Credential in Social Science is awarded by the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing (CCTC) upon completion of a baccalaureate degree and the stateapproved UCI teacher education program which includes a semester of student teaching or a year of intern teaching.

Students must also complete a college-level course or pass an examination on the U.S. Constitution, pass the California Basic Skills Test (CBEST), and verify subject matter competence. This competence can be verified by passing the CSET exam OR by completing all course work in the approved subject matter preparation program. Use the information below to plan your undergraduate course work so that you can waive the exams verifying subject matter competence.

Subject Matter Preparation Program requirements may be satisfied easily while you are an undergraduate, but it is important that you plan early to be sure you select the right courses. As you know, the School of Social Sciences, recognizing that its majors have diverse goals, allows students wide latitude in selecting their courses. Those preparing to teach, however, know they will need a broad foundation in world and US history as well as many other areas of the Social Sciences. Participation in the Subject Matter Preparation Program will include study in behavioral science, economics, geography, anthropology and political science. The program will also include cultural studies and world philosophies. You will be expected to participate in fieldwork with K-12 students and the Academic Resource Center in 369 Social Science Tower is one of many resources on campus you can use to find out about these opportunities. Last, in consultation with your SMPP advisor, you will build a supplementary portfolio documenting your educational and classroom preparation for teaching.
